Others places explored were the Stonehaus Winery and Alexanders. But not everyone went sightseeing,



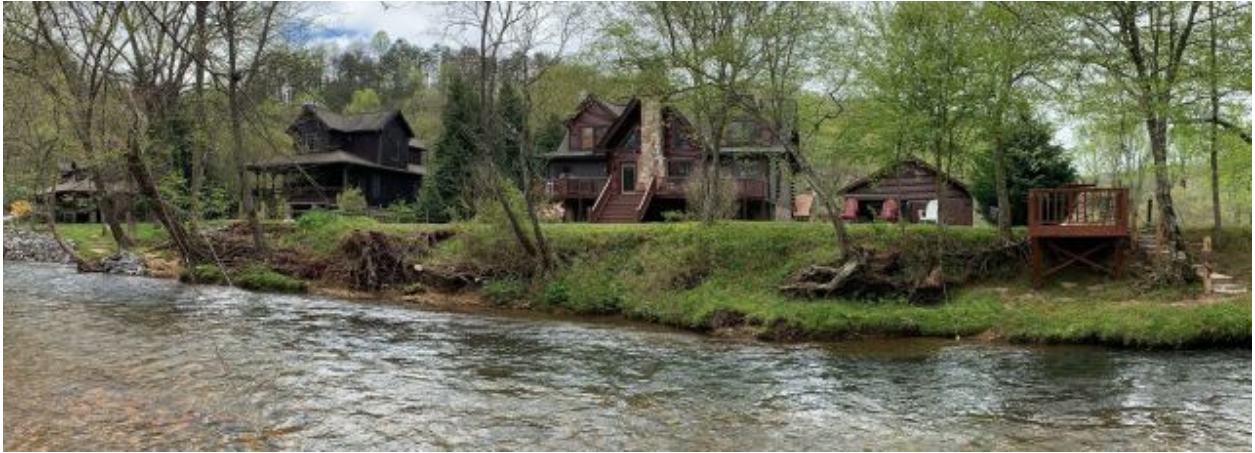


as they just enjoyed visiting within the campground, and/or kicked backed and relaxed in this restful area.
