Why Do People Touch the Ceiling When **Driving Through a Yellow Light?** By: Author Kyle & Olivia Brady



You may have seen a passenger do it or perhaps another driver. You may even do it yourself! The practice of touching the ceiling of your vehicle while driving through a yellow light is one of a

handful of superstitions that are relatively common throughout the U.S.

But what exactly does it mean? Let's take a closer look. Why Do People Touch the Ceiling When Driving Through a Yellow Light?

Touching the ceiling while driving through a yellow light is generally seen as a protective gesture. It ensures the driver and passengers safely make it through the intersection without any accidents or other incidents.

Some drivers also kiss their hands before touching the ceiling, presumably for some extra protection. Alternately, some drivers view the gesture as a "thank you" sign, expressing gratitude to the universe, luck, or some higher power. It's not clear exactly why this would provide any luck or protection or how this habit came to be. Still, you'll find it's a habit of drivers young and old, from all parts of the country and worldwide. Many drivers can't tell you why they do it either.

Other Common Driving Superstitions

If you're a "ceiling toucher," you're certainly not alone in practicing driving superstitions.

There are plenty of little habits that, while their origins and effects are murky, make you feel better as you hit the road. Let's take a look.

Holding Your Breath While Passing a Graveyard

This is one of the more well-known driving superstitions. Holding your breath while passing a graveyard is said to prevent breathing any ghosts or spirits into your body. People also think it shows respect to the dead by not breathing in front of them when they obviously can't.

Holding Your Breath While Driving Through a Tunnel

Unlike holding your breath past a graveyard, holding your breath while driving through a tunnel has much less grim associations. People believe this driving superstition will bring good luck to those who accomplish it.

Alternatively, holding your breath for the length of a tunnel could also grant a wish to those who are successful. As with holding our breath past a graveyard, you should be careful trying this one. Don't hold your breath too long if you're the one behind the wheel.

Lifting Your Feet Over Railroad Tracks or Bridges

This driving superstition has two very different interpretations. In the first, not picking up your feet as you go over the tracks means you'll never find true love.

Or you could lose your current partner. Another interpretation says that picking up your feet supposedly prevents you from dying young. In any case, this is a superstition best practiced by passengers only.

Tossing Loose Change on the Floor of a New Car

If you see loose change on the floor of someone's car, it may be more than some forgotten coins. It's a tradition known as "car coining."

The practice of tossing change onto the floor of a new car aims to bring good luck to the vehicle and its owner. Even if it doesn't bring you any luck, you'll at least have some spare change hanging around for parking meters or tolls.

Honking Before or While in a Tunnel

While it might startle those unfamiliar with the superstition, honking before or during a drive through a tunnel is pretty common.

Many believe it will help them pass through the tunnel safely. It may be part of a lingering habit from days when narrow tunnels did pose actual safety risks.

Others may have heard stories about ghosts or evil spirits inhabiting the tunnels or surrounding areas. The honk may be an effort to ward them off.

Touch the roof, hold your breath, or honk your horn while driving if you're a superstitious driver.

Where Do Superstitions Come From?

As you may be able to tell from the superstitions listed above, these small habits of dubious effectiveness have many different origins. Some are based on religious or cultural beliefs about life, death, and luck.

Others have their origins in true-life events or safety concerns that may no longer be necessary or valid. Some may simply have no detectable origins at all. These may have just started as a habit that grew and spread over time.

Are Driving Superstitions Based in Reality?

Most drivers, even those who practice these superstitions, will likely acknowledge they're not real or effective. While they may have origins in actual events or practices, there's simply no evidence that doing any of these things will protect you. However, many feel they're harmless. If they make you feel better, that's a bonus in and of itself.

Quirky Driving Superstitions Are Muscle Memory to Most of Us Whether you touch the roof, hold your breath, or honk your horn, many of us observe these small superstitions without even thinking.

These behaviors are simple muscle memory to most people, who may have been doing them for years. While how effective they are is questionable at best, driving superstitions aren't going anywhere anytime soon.

10 Surprising Uses for Windex That Go Beyond Cleaning Glass

You can use Windex for more than just cleaning windows. Chris Zuppa/The Penny Hoarder

Vinegar isn't the only super performer in your kitchen. Windex — that \$3 glass cleaner spray you keep under your sink — can be used to detail the interior of your car, to put the shine back in your jewelry and even to unstick zippers.

Your store shelves probably carry several varieties of Windex, so if you're cleaning fabric, stick with the clear version, and if you're using it for a car, use the Windex Ammonia-free Glass Cleaner.

Aside from those suggestions, any of the Windex variations will do the job.

Here are 10 surprisingly effective uses for that familiar blue (or sometimes clear) bottle.

1. Moving Large Pieces of Furniture

Los Angeles-based interior designer <u>John Linden</u> uses Windex to slide large items that are stuck or too heavy to move.

"All we need to do is to spritz some in front of the objects we want to move before pushing the item," Linden says. He's then able to easily move that piece of furniture to its place.

As long as you use the ammonia-free version of Windex, you can use it on any type of flooring, including hardwood.

2. Cleaning Carpets and Upholstered Furniture

You thought Windex only worked on glass? Linden says he'll often spray Windex onto small stains, leaving it for 20 minutes to soak. Then he wipes right off the furniture.

Make sure to use the clear formula for this, as the blue formula may leave its own stains.

3. Insect Repellant

The smell of ammonia is strongly disliked by many insects, says Andrew Barker, founder of <u>Homeowner Costs</u>. As a result, Barker suggests spraying Windex by opening windows and doors to keep bugs at bay.

4. Clean Your Car

Windex is also a great cleanser for cars, says Deidre Fisher, owner of <u>Simply Bliss Cleaning</u> in Salt Lake City, Utah. Use it on window and mirror smudges, on dashboards, the steering wheel and any plastic and leather surface. It's also great for cleaning the screens and dials. "I just recommend spraying the cloth first and not the electronics directly," Fisher says.

5. Washing Makeup Brushes

Makeup artist and <u>lifestyle blogger Kerrin Jackson</u> has been using Windex to clean her brushes and airbrush parts for more than a decade.

"They make light work of breaking down the alcohol-based makeups and heavy-duty body makeup products that can sometimes be stubborn and difficult to clean from the inner workings of the airbrush parts," Jackson says.

6. De-greasing Your Kitchen

Use Windex on your exhaust fans and range hoods in your kitchen, suggests Diana Rodriguez-Zaba, president of <u>ServiceMaster Restoration by Zaba</u>, a cleaning company in Chicago.

Rodriguez-Zaba suggests spraying Windex on the surfaces and letting it stand for 5-10 minutes, then wiping it clean and rinsing with water to remove any remaining chemical residue.

7. Shine and Clean Doorknobs

The slight amount of ammonia in Windex can disinfect germy doorknobs, something we are all hyper aware of in these pandemic days. And it can also get clean up smudges and bring some shine to the doorknobs throughout your house.

8. Removing Stains From Clothing

It works well for red wine, tomato sauce, ketchup and more, says Jen Stark, founder of <u>Happy DIY Home</u>, a gardening and home improvement blog.

"You can lightly spray the stain with Windex and let it sit for 15 minutes, as long as the clothing item isn't a delicate silk," Stark said. "Get a clean cloth and blot at the stain before rinsing it in cold water."

Follow this by washing the clothing as recommended. Make sure you use clear Windex for this task.

9. Cleaning Patio Furniture and Outdoor Surfaces

Benjamin Nguyen, owner of <u>Full Color Cleaners</u>, says he uses Windex to clean his patio furniture, making it look as good as new. It will clean everything from the furniture to outdoor surfaces, including brick.

For this task, go the extra mile and snag the <u>Windex Outdoor</u> <u>Concentrated Cleaner</u>, which is a 32-ounce spray bottle that attaches onto a hose (\$27.66). Spray onto your aluminum siding, your brick, your windows — and with this tool, you won't even need a ladder to do it.

10. Making Jewelry Sparkle

To get rid of everyday grime from a diamond ring, <u>The</u> <u>Knot</u> recommends soaking it for 10 to 15 minutes in a 50-50 solution of hydrogen peroxide and Windex. After it's soaked, brush gently with a soft toothbrush and then rinse with water. Windex is safe for gold and silver but could be harmful to soft gemstones because of its ammonia content. That means don't use it on turquoise, emeralds, opals, coral, pearls or amber.



The World's Oldest Known RV Sold for a Fortune

Do you like antique RVs? Well, in this article, we reveal one that will knock your socks off! We look at the oldest known RV in the world. Keep reading to learn about the

RV and its history. And to make things even more interesting, it's for sale and up for auction.

What Is the World's Oldest Known RV?

The world's oldest known RV is on a 1914 Ford Model T chassis. While RVs didn't exactly exist yet in 1914, this living space on wheels is quite innovative.

The family that owned Bentalls Department Store



commissioned the Model T. Dunton of Reading, the company that developed caravans and horse-drawn carriages, produced it. In the 1970s, a cabinet maker refurbished it. It has an iron stove for

heating and cooking and a leather couch for sleeping that can hold four people. It's still usable and everything on it works.

While the 1914 Ford Model T is the oldest known RV still intact, it wasn't necessarily the first ever made. The RV/MH Hall of Fame claims the first RV was the 1910 Pierce-Arrow Touring Landau. It was a 66-horsepower six-cylinder large car with a seat that turned into a bed. It also had a wash basin, a portable toilet, and cooking gear under the seats. While it was very expensive at the time, they sold several, but none remain today.



Why Is the World's Oldest Known RV Being Auctioned Off? The 1914 Ford Model T RV was auctioned off at the National Motor Museum in the UK by the family that owned it. While the auction is complete, you might want to keep your eyes open for future news about this

antique RV. The RV was <u>auctioned</u> off for \$75,000. It may seem low for an

antique RV, but it actually went for double than many expected it would go for.

What Is Inside the Ford Model T RV?

The 1914 Ford Model T RV has a leather sofa that serves as the driver's seat. You can also turn it around to face the living area of the RV. You'll also find bunk beds in the Model T and beautiful handcrafted wood cabinetry. From cupboards to wardrobes, there is a lot of storage space.

The vintage RV also has an iron stove for heating and cooking. Additionally, you'll find the large windows provide natural

lighting. Also, there are double doors that lead to steps exiting the living part of the RV.

In addition, there was a 10-gallon fuel tank. The transmission had two forward gears and one reverse. They controlled it with foot pedals.

At the RV/MH Hall of Fame, you'll find a 1916 Ford Model T RV with slide-outs or, as they called them back then, telescopes. It surprisingly has many features you'll find in modern RVs, such as a cooking station, a cooler, storage, and more. One model in the series even had a shower.
